The International Labour Review (ILR)

2021 marks the 100th anniversary of the ILO's peer-reviewed journal, the International Labour Review (ILR). An <u>ILR timeline</u> summarizes 100 years of knowledge sharing, analysis and debate.



The ILR, dating to the Treaty of Versailles, was established in 1921 by the ILO Governing Body. The Review contributes to advancing academic research and informing policy debate in fields related to the world of work. As indicated in Part XIII of the Treaty of Peace of Versailles, "The ILO ... will edit and publish in French and English, and in such other languages as the Governing Body may think desirable, a periodical paper dealing with problems of industry and employment of international interest."

To mark the 100^{th} anniversary of the Review, the Office launched an online Centenary Collection with articles on the ILR's history and guest-edited Centenary Issues. (ILO Library colleagues contributed to the launch by separating apart, digitizing and uploading ILR articles, to ensure accessibility of the ILR in different languages including Japanese and German through its institutional repository, <u>Labordoc</u>.)
